PPRAG 1411 Pharmacological Management of Chronic Pain (1.5qhrs)

Max: None

Course Director: Dr. Robert Kronenberg

Description: The objective of this course is to provide students with a basic understanding of the differences between chronic and acute pain. Pharmacological treatment of acute pain is relatively straightforward; management of chronic pain is often complicated and rarely achieves the patient quality of life goals. Upon completion of this course students will understand how to assess pain; understand the differences between addiction, dependence, and tolerance; be able to recommend appropriate medication therapies for nociceptive and neuropathic pain; understand the reasons for the multitude of available analgesic choices; understand the role of complementary and alternative medicine (CAM); and be conversant with the legal and ethical issues of pain management.

Prerequisite: PHIDG 1607 Integrated Sequence 7

PPRAG 1420 Pharmacy Based Immunization Delivery-AzPA (2qhrs)

Max: 75

Course Director: Dr. Dawn Gerber

This class is offered on one weekend (April 26 – 27). There are approximately 12 to 15 hours of pre-course on-line modules and a quiz that must be completed prior to the class.

Description: Pharmacy-Based Immunization Delivery is an innovative and interactive training program that teaches pharmacists & student pharmacists the skills necessary to become a primary source for vaccine information and administration. The program teaches the basics of immunology and focuses on practice implementation and legal/regulatory issues.

Prerequisite: MICRG 1553 Immunology; and blood-borne pathogen training.

PPRAG 1445 A Foundation for Leadership (2.0qhrs)

Max: 25

Course Director: Dr. Sam Katzif

Description: Given the complex and demanding environment of health care, effective leadership is often required to meet these challenges. This course is designed to provide you with the foundational tools for actionable access to being who you need to be, to be a leader, and with what it takes to exercise leadership effectively in all aspects of your life. This course is a leadership laboratory in which you will discover for yourself a new context for leader and leadership. Instead of more knowledge about leadership, you will gain access to actually being a leader and effectively exercising leadership as your natural self-expression through in class discussions, group work, out-of-class assignments, and a leadership project. During the course your current thoughts on leadership will be challenged, new ways of thinking will emerge, and you will leave with new actions to create even greater success in the areas of life and leadership that matter most to you.

PPRAG 1449 Advanced Research Methods: Using Analytics in Health Care Research (3.0qhrs)

Max: 10

Course Director: Dr. Kathleen Fairman

Description: This course is designed to give students practical, hands-on experience in literature review, development of research questions and hypotheses, study design, analytics, and research reporting. Working iteratively throughout the course, students develop a research project on a topic of their choice, complete an ethics application, analyze the data, and produce a final research report. The report may be cited as a research project on applications for residency or fellowship, and may be suitable for conversion after course completion to a poster presentation for one or more scientific meetings. Focus is on practical methods, effective project management, and basic interpretive techniques to facilitate research projects for residency, fellowship, or employment. The course prepares students to engage and collaborate effectively with a health care team, using evidence-based, accurate analysis and clear communication about statistical results.

Prerequisite: PPRAG 1672 Research Methods and Epidemiology and PPRAG 1676, with a grade of "B" or better in both courses, and permission of the instructor

IPECG 1402C Improving Patient Safety 2 (1.5qhrs)

Initial Max: 15 (CPG)

Course Directors: Dr. Cara Copeland (CDMA), Dr. Larry Sands (AZCOM); Dr. Shawn Tennant (CPG) Enrollment depends on CDMA

Description: This interprofessional on-line course will introduce students to how they can improve patient safety and reduce medical errors. The course instruction is through on-line Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI) educational modules, reinforcing

that knowledge through authentic-team case study discussions and self-reflection writings. **Completion of IPECG 1401 and IPECG 1402 (Spring 2023) will lead to an IHI certificate.**

Prerequisite: Enrollees must be in PS-2 year. (PS-2 standing)

PPRAG 1301 (1.5qhrs) or PPRAG 1302 (3qhrs): Special Project/Research

PSCIG 1301 (1.5qhrs) or PSCIG 1302 (3qhrs): Special Project/Research

Course Director: Faculty Sponsor

Description: This course provides an opportunity for students to work with individual faculty mentors on projects of variable scope but always projects with academic rigor. Activities covered under Special Projects may include library, laboratory or survey-type research that is intended to result in publication or a poster. All work related to a Special Project must occur in the quarter academic elective credit is sought. All Special Projects require prior review for academic rigor and approval by both the appropriate Department Chair and the Dean's Office. A Special Project Request Form must be completed and provided to the Department Chair, outlining specifically what the student will be responsible for and the hours and location(s) involved. Special Projects can be graded pass/fail or for a letter grade, but how the grade will be determined must be clearly described. A Special Project Form must be completed (including signatures) in addition to online registration for enrollment and prior to the last Friday of the first week of the quarter for which academic credit is sought.
