IPECG 1420C:	Antibiotic Stewardship (1.5qhrs)	Max: Variable
Instructors:	Dr. Cara Copeland and Dr. Shawn Tennant	
Description:	This interprofessional elective course provides education on the appropriate use of antibiotics as outlined by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Topics covered include increasing antibiotic resistance and the importance of antibiotic stewardship, an overview of the incidence of antibiotic adverse drug reactions, background and errors in antibiotic use, drivers of inappropriate antibiotic use, and considerations for specific infections including otitis media, bronchitis, asthma, COPD, and pharyngitis. Special attention will be paid to the current guidelines and recommendations for antibiotic use in dentistry for pre-op or pre-treatment prophylaxis. The course will utilize a combination of on-line educational modules, quizzes on the content covered in those modules, and interprofessional team-based case discussions of the module content.

PPRAG 1338:	Pharmacy Based Screenings (1.5qhrs)	Max: 30
Instructor:	Dr. Katherine Reeves	
Description:	Through active participation in lecture discussions as well as laboratory exercises, the student will be prepared to develop health-screening programs in a variety of pharmacy practice settings. The focus is risk factor assessment and hands-on experience with technological devices related to cancer, cardiovascular disease (blood pressure and cholesterol), diabetes, and osteoporosis. This course will address OSHA training, CLIA regulations, policies and procedures, and implementation of screening programs. The course meets once weekly for either lecture or a lab/workshop. The course evaluation is based upon competency assessment of techniques during the lab/workshop, two group projects, and a final quiz.

PPRAG 1411	Pharmacological Management of Chronic Pain (1.5qhrs)	Max: none
Instructor:	Dr. Robert Kronenberg	
Description:	The objective of this course is to provide students with a basic understanding of the differences between chronic and acute pain. Pharmacological treatment of acute pain is relatively straightforward; management of chronic pain is often complicated and rarely achieves the patient quality of life goals. Upon completion of this course students will understand how to assess pain; understand the differences between addiction, dependence and tolerance; be able to recommend appropriate medication therapies for nociceptive and neuropathic pain; understand the reasons for the multitude of available analgesic choices; understand the role of complementary and alternative medicine (CAM); and be conversant with the legal and ethical issues of pain management.

PPRAG 1415:	Rare and Interesting Diseases	Max: 18
Instructor:	Dr. Mindy Burnworth	
Description:	This course provides a forum for students to learn how to manage patients with rare and interesting disease states. The pathophysiology, epidemiology, clinical manifestations, diagnostic tests or procedures, treatment and the pharmacist's role in the management for each disease state/genetic abnormality/adverse drug events will be reviewed. Activities will simulate patient work up and written/oral presentations in clinical practice.	
Prerequisite:	Completion of or concurrent enrollment in PHIDG 1609 Integrated Sequence 9	
PPRAG 1426	Putting Your Best Residency Foot Forward (1.5qhrs)	Max: 35
Instructor:	Dr. Dawn Gerber	
Description:	Post-graduate pharmacy residency programs are highly valuable and are becoming increasingly competitive. This elective course provides guidance on the residency selection decision process, curriculum vita (CV) development, creation of a strong letter of intent and interviewing skills. Students will learn and apply how to incorporate experiences from their didactic, experiential, and co-curricular education into their residency application and	

interview. To meet the learning objectives, students will complete interactive written and verbal activities to demonstrate knowledge, skills, and abilities. Achievement of learning objectives will be evaluated by assessment rubrics tailored to each activity. Must be PS-2 status to enroll.

- PPRAG 1438 Managed Care (1.5qhrs)** Max: 50
Instructor: John Pacey, BS Pharm, RPh
Description: The purpose of this course is to provide an overview of managed care pharmacy and how it impacts the U.S. healthcare system. The course will prepare students to understand and learn about professional practice opportunities in managed care pharmacy by exploring health care reform, managed health care delivery models, prescription benefit design, pharmacy networks, utilization management tools, P&T Committees, pharmacy data management, pharmacy benefit managers, specialty pharmacy and pharmaceutical manufacturers. In addition, the course will focus on how business principles are integrated into the managed care pharmacy department, and address how clinical pharmacy, quality improvement, medication therapy management/disease management programs are coordinated within the managed care pharmacy environment.
- PPRAG 1439 Pediatric Pharmacotherapy (1.5qhrs)** Max: 25
Instructor: Dr. Titilola Afolabi
Description: This elective focuses on specific issues related to the treatment and care of pediatric patients. Clinical topics include common childhood illness and treatments as well as drug delivery systems used for pediatric patients, current controversies in pediatric pharmacotherapy, commonly used over-the-counter medications and alternative therapies used by pediatric patients. This course incorporates lectures, projects and reading assignments to enhance student learning about pediatric issues.
Prerequisite: PHIDG 1609 (IS 9) **Co-requisite:** PPRAG 1701 Acute Care Management
- PPRAG 1443 Veterinary Pharmacology (1.5qhrs)** Max: 25
Course Director: Dr. Tokiko Kushiro-Banker
Description: This course is designed to enhance the knowledge of future community pharmacists in the area of small animal veterinary pharmacology, dispensing of common small animal prescriptions, and recommendations of OTC medications for common household pets. Primary focus will be on cats and dogs. This course includes two 1-hour on-site sessions: one at the MWU Companion Animal Clinic, one at a local pet compounding pharmacy. The Final Exam in this class will be during class time in the Testing Center.
Prerequisite: Completion of PHIDG 1609, Integrated Sequence 9
- PSCIG 1323: Use & Abuse of Drugs (1.5qhrs)** Max: None
Instructor: Dr. Oliver Grundmann
Description: This online elective course provides an in-depth review of neuropharmacology of substances of abuse including stimulants, depressants and inhalants, ethanol, opioids, hallucinogens, marijuana, anabolic steroids and other performance enhancing drugs. In addition, an overview of drug use, drug use as a social problem, drug products and their regulations, the nervous system, the mechanism of action of drugs, preventing substance abuse and dependence will also be covered.
Prerequisite: PHIDG 1503 Integrated Sequence 3
- PPRAG 1301 or PSCIG 1301: Special Project/Research (1.5qhrs)**
PPRAG 1302 or PSCIG 1302: Special Project/Research (3.0qhrs)
Course Director: Faculty Sponsor
Description: A Special Project/Research is an opportunity for a student to work with an individual faculty mentor on a project focused on laboratory, clinical or outcomes-based research that is intended to result in publication or a poster. A Special Project Request Form must be completed and provided to the Department Chair and the Dean's Office at least one week prior to the start of the quarter, outlining specifically what the student will be responsible for completing, the hours and location(s) involved, and how the project will be graded. All Special Project Request Forms are submitted with the expectation that the appropriate Department Chair and the Dean's Office will review the request for substantial demonstration of academic rigor worthy of 1.5 credit hours (for 1301 projects) or 3.0 credit hours (for 1302 projects) in the CPG curriculum. Projects that do not meet the academic rigor requirement will not be approved.
